

Hi John-Below is the email I sent to Jack Hayes today after reading the report.

"I have pored through the report and have not found a single mention of the accomplishments of the Brown Sailing program. Do you fail to regard this as a sport? Are you aware that the program is one of the top programs in the country? Do you know that the team has the highest academic record among all sailing programs? Do you know that the women's team was #1 in the country in 2018 and has ranked #1 in the 2019 standings?

Those sailors are as dedicated as any of the athletes Brown and are fortunate to have, in John Mallicone, one of the premier coaches in the country.

As an alumnus of Brown and a regular donor to the school and the sailing program, I am disappointed by your shortsightedness. These student athletes deserve recognition, and I hope you will amend your oversight in the future.

Hayes"s response: "Thanks for your note. I do reference the women's national championship in the opening letter. We are proud of the team's accomplishments and will continue to look to effective ways to recognize the group."
