Hi Jack,

Thanks for the call today and excited to be talking about this with you!

Here are the current team numbers for 2019-2020: 42 sailors on the roster (21 males, 21 females). Of the 42, 30 of them were mainly competing each weekend at the varsity level (14 males, 16 females). The other 12 were more part-time, recreational sailors who also competed at lower level events, not on a regular basis. 18 of this year's team were high level sailors or recruits and everyone else I would consider a walk on.

Looking at our incoming freshman and the team for 2020-2021, we are looking at 40 or so (without walk ons we don't know about yet). 18 males and 22 females total (a lot of females in the incoming class).

I think the numbers we were talking about are about right to have a strong varsity coed and women's team: 12 plus males and 18 plus females for 30 total. Most like varsity college sailing teams had the following 2019-2020 numbers:

These other Ivy League varsity teams are smaller than we are because they are varsity programs so they have less walk ons. They do all have recreational sailing, so we could keep a 30 or so varsity roster and have everyone else be on the Yacht Club team and they could compete at lower level, yacht club style events (we are already doing that). These walk ons can fill varsity spots as needed. Some of our best student-athletes in the program were not recruits or had no racing experience but developed into starters at the varsity level or All-Americans by the time they are Juniors or Seniors (even earlier sometimes, Louisa Chafee is a great example).

All females in college sailing have the bonus of competing in both coed and women's events. Over the past two years our top sailors were women and they mainly only sailed the top level coed events, except the Women's New England Championship and the Women's National Championship. Every weekend throughout the fall and spring seasons there is a Coed Varsity level event, a Women's Varsity level event, and a number of other events each weekend.
